

Important Places in Magdeburg

1	Magdalene Chapel	This gothic building was constructed in 1315 as a chapel for Corpus Christi.
2	Town hall	The renaissance style town hall was built in the end of the 16 th century. The storefront shows Italian influence.
3	Main station	The main station's entrance hall was built in the 19 th century in an Italian neo-renaissance style.
4	St. Sebastian	The romanic St. Sebastian church is a dominant church in the diocese of Magdeburg.
5	Convent of Our Lady	This convent is one of the most significant Romanic buildings in Germany. Its foundation dates back to the early 11 th century. The Order of Praemonstratensian Order served here for centuries. Today it is used for cultural occasions like concerts and exhibitions.
6	Cathedral	In 937 A.D. Otto I built a convent on this location. The reconstruction as a Gothic cathedral began in 1209 and was inspired by the monumental French cathedrals.
7	17th June Square	On June 17 th 1953, over 1 million people demonstrated in the eastern part of Germany against the inhuman working conditions prescribed by the communist government. Streets and places in many German cities commemorate this date. It was the first public rebellion after World War II against a communist regime, which suppressed many citizens in a brutal way.
8	Hasselbach Square	This square is an example for the Wilhelminian style (in the fourth quarter of the 19 th century).
9	Hegel street	In the course of a city enlargement, this street emerged at the end of the 19 th century as a residential area for rich people.
10	Navigation museum	The navigation museum was opened in 1974 and shows the history of the inland navigation on the
