## Handout 1 – Remembering the Darkest Chapter

## Group 1

## **Group Research Activity**

Your group has been assigned one of the following topics viewed or discussed in Part 1 of "The German History Scavenger Hunt" to research: Memorials and Remembrance, Holocaust survivor Margot (Bendheim) Friedlander, or *Theresienstadt* 'Model' Ghetto.

Your group must prepare a presentation (format of the group's choice) to share with the rest of the class. The presentation must help your classmates learn more about the topic and help them to address the Supporting Question: What can we learn from the darkest chapters of history?

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## **Group 1: Memorials and Remembrance**

Your group will research three memorials. For each, explain the history and significance of the memorial's location, the design of the memorial, and its place in the history of the Holocaust.

1. <u>Places of Remembrance</u> - A series of images at the start of Part 1 show signs with images and text on lamp poles. The 'Places of Remembrance' memorial consists of 80 signs attached to lamp posts in the Bavarian Quarter of Berlin, and each one has one of the many Nazi laws that Jews had to follow during the occupation.

- 2. <u>Gleis 17 Memorial</u> Located at the Berlin-Grunewald S-Bahn station, the <u>Gleis 17 Memorial commemorates</u> the deportations of Berlin Jews to ghettos and extermination camps in the east, conducted by the <u>Deutsche Reichsbahn</u> between the autumn of 1941 and spring of 1942.
